Blog: Approaching REL Central Work Through an Equity Lens

We know that a variety of factors, in and out of schools, influence student achievement, and we know that our education systems consistently serve some students less well than others. But do we know what factors we should focus on to ensure that all students have equitable opportunities to learn and succeed? Check out this blog post by REL Central Director Phillip Herman to learn about how we and our partnerships are thinking through this issue at REL Central.

Where in the world is REL Central?

Taŋyáŋ yahípi. (Welcome, it is good that you have come).

Our partners at Standing Rock Tribal Education Department and Sitting Bull College believe that many Lakota and Dakota learners may be alienated by the way math is taught in reservation schools. This is because math instruction is currently based on a western model of math teaching and learning that might not be well suited to the needs of many Native American learners. As we begin the partnership work of integrating Lakota and Dakota culture into elementary math instruction on the Standing Rock Reservation, two recent trips to the reservation have begun to bring school-based educators into the partnership. In the first week of August, Doug Van Dine, senior researcher at REL Central, traveled to Standing Rock to connect with this year's cohort of Wawokiya Teachers during their initial orientation. Wawokiya Teachers are experienced teachers or paraprofessionals in the district who strive to implement the Oceti Sakowin Essential Understandings and Standards (OSEUS) into the classroom, provide OSEUS support at their schools, and facilitate OSEUS and Lakota language and culture projects in their schools.

During the week, Van Dine participated in the orientation alongside the Wawokiya Teachers, learning about the Lakota and Dakota culture and language from presenters such as Dakota Good House and Elliot Bannister, and beginning the work of aligning current curriculum and lesson plans with OSEUS. Van

Dine was also able to share about the partnership work to develop culturally infused modules to support math in grades 3–5, which was met with excitement by several of the teachers and paraprofessionals. To further build partnership connections, the following week Van Dine attended a weeklong, virtual class led by Danny Luecke, who is leading the work of the Dakota/Lakota Math Connections project to develop reference pages to support math and language fluency.

Additionally, Phillip Herman, REL
Central director, traveled to Standing
Rock during the week of August 15.
While there, he met with members of
the Tribal Council serving on the Health,

Education, and Wellness Committee, as well as Dr. Laurel Vermillion, Sitting Bull College president, to share about the proposed partnership work. Throughout the week, Herman traveled to each of the larger elementary schools on the reservation, sharing with principals and instructional coaches who all expressed excitement about the partnership and work. Herman's week at Standing Rock culminated with the opportunity to share directly with Standing Rock teachers about the partnership work at the 2022 Professional Development Day.
